Think of all of the time and energy we save by choosing the path of least resistance! Does anyone else revel in the instant gratification of the "Buy with 1-Click" button? I know I do. That's why the following quote stopped me in my tracks when I saw it on social media:

"Churches don't need to be Amazon. We need to move away from focusing on convenience and move towards connection and real relationships."

We only have so much time and energy in a given day, so it's perfectly understandable we use convenience as a barometer for decision making. But is it possible that we can get stuck in a cycle of convenience? What are we missing out on by constantly choosing ease and convenience?

I believe we lose depth in connections and relationships. Sure, I can text my friend throughout the day, but that's

never the same as calling them on the phone or sitting down for a face-to-face conversation. I can watch sermons online, but it can't replace the experience of gathering together with other Christians to worship together. Relationships require time and intentionality. Relationships take work to develop and nurture. This applies to our relationships with our family, friends and God. These relationships can grow shallow if we choose to show up only when it's convenient.

This month, I invite you to join me in considering ways we can be more intentional in how we connect with God and others. If you want spend more time with God in prayer, I commend to you the "Daily Devotions for Individuals and Families" on pages 136-140 in the Book of Common Praver. If you want to connect more with your St.Paul's family, I invite you to "sit and stay a while" with us between services for coffee hour and formation.

We build relationships by showing up and being present. So let's choose connection over convenience!


Tell the Story

Uniform Drive: Crestwood Elementary School


St. Paul's is partnering with the P.T.O. of Crestwood Elementary School to help stock their uniform closet. What do we need?
